LET'S TALK

1. What impacted you the most from this week's message?
2. What's one area in your life where you want to be great?
3. The gospel writer Mark wants disciples to do a "heart check" to see where they are living according to the values of the world instead of according to the values of God (Mark 8:33).
Do you think this is easy to do? Why or why not?
4. Read Mark 10:35-45
 - What do you think motivated James and John's desire for greatness?
 - How do you think the world defines "greatness?" Pastor Jeremy says that "True greatness is seeking the best for others even at great cost to yourself."
How is this definition similar or different than the world's definition?
 - What was Jesus' motivation for going to the cross? How was this different than what James and John assumed?
 - In our culture, do you think being a servant is seen in a positive or negative way?
Why do you think that is?
 - What is the hardest part of being a servant for you?
5. Pastor Jeremy says, "We are a so that people! This means that God's blessings aren't for you to keep. You're not blessed to have a comfortable life. You're not blessed just to be happy. You're blessed to be a blessing. To shine wherever you go and to share God's love to a broken and hurting world."
