How have you experienced this in the intercultural ministry at Cornerstone? What are some things you appreciate most about worshipping with a diverse community? What are some challenges?

5. Read John 1:14 and John 20:21. God became a flesh-and-blood human being in Jesus so that he could personally relate with people and share his love with them. What does it mean for you that God wants a relationship with you so much that he comes to us in the person of Jesus?
